Pediatric Therapy Expansion



The CHRISTUS Cabrini Pediatric Therapy Center is the largest pediatric service provider in the Central Louisiana area, serving children exhibiting developmental difficulties, concerns or medical conditions. Our facility historically holds over 4,000 therapy sessions per month for occupational, speech and physical therapy. Unfortunately, even at this high number, there have always been hundreds of children on the waiting list.

Luckily, this is quickly changing thanks to our 2021 Cabrini Foundation donors who helped to fund a \$200,000 expansion of our Pediatric Therapy Center, essentially doubling their space. On October 12, 2021, the Cabrini Foundation held a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony and Blessing of the new expansion, officially opening the new space to the public. This expansion has allowed the Pediatric Therapy team to hire additional staff, adding over 850 appointments per month and drastically reducing the waiting list.

The new space offers a brand new physical therapy gym specifically built for orthopedics in adolescents, a low stimulation sensory room geared towards children who have more significant sensory processing disorders or autism, and a specialized functional living skills gym complete with a bedroom and dressing area.

RetCam

The newest high-tech addition to our Newborn Intensive Care Unit is the RetCam. Purchased through the Children's Miracle Network, this system allows our Neonatal Specialists to obtain high-quality, ocular imaging of infants, most commonly used for evaluation of Retinopathy of Prematurity (ROP), a common eye disease that can affect the vision in premature infants. The success of the RetCam in the field has represented a huge leap in pediatric ocular imaging, setting a new standard of care. Our Neonatal team at CHRISTUS St. Frances Cabrini Hospital utilizes this equipment regularly, allowing them to accurately and effectively track their NICU patients' ocular development while in our care.

The room is complete with life-saving pediatric medical equipment, as well as toys, coloring books, playdough, bravery badges (specialized Band-Aids), and even tablets to help distract them in what is typically a scary situation. In addition, each pediatric patient is gifted a Cabrini Teddy Bear that the medical staff use to demonstrate where they will be putting a mask for a breathing treatment, or inserting an IV.

Scott Wells was a quiet man who led a quiet life – a farmer on the outskirts of town. But, if you mention his name around the CHRISTUS St. Frances Cabrini Cancer Center, he is a hero. Scott lost his 8-year battle with cancer this summer at only 42, but it was what he did with this time left that leaves a mark on so many.

It was these relationships that inspired him to do what he could to give back. His calling manifested itself in a barrel race specifically created to support patients below the poverty line in need

of transportation, nutrition and medical supplies as they undergo treatment. Over the last 5 years Scott spent nearly every spare moment planning and fundraising for this annual event. His passion and dedication have grown it into one of the premiere barrel races in Louisiana, welcoming over 1,000 riders and raising more than \$200,000 for Cabrini cancer patients in need. Even as his health deteriorated and his prognosis grew grim, his heart for this cause remained strong. So strong, in fact, that he spent his final months assembling a team of individuals to carry on the fundraising event after his passing. Central Louisiana suffered a tremendous loss this year, but Scott's legacy lives on. The Patient Assistance fund for the Cancer Center now bears his name and will continue to grow and provide for those in need because of the passion and persistence of one, Scott Wells.

MEET Trey 1 YEAR OLD

Trey was born emergently at 34 weeks when his mom developed COVID-19. Weighing only 5 lbs. 6 oz., Trey required around-the-clock intensive care in the high level III Cabrini Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). A special

CMN funded NIC VIEW camera, now available in each NICU room, allowed Trey's family to stream live, around the clock newborn video of him to their smart phones and pads at home. "Because I was COVID positive, I couldn't physically be with Trey in the NICU. The NIC View camera gave me a safe way to support him from a distance, and to feel connected as we both recovered." – Kimberly Mixon, Trey's Mom





MEET Macie 4 YEARS OLD

Macie was diagnosed with progressive and permanent hearing loss when she was born. Due to her inability to hear sounds, Macie's speech is nonexistent at 4 years old. Not satisfied, Macie's parents found a specialist willing to surgically replace her cochlear with a cochlear implant device that can be adjusted virtually through a smart phone or computer. This research-based intervention is creating new neural brain pathways that support the efficient conversion of incoming sounds to outgoing speech. Now that she can hear sounds, Macie is finally learning to talk by working with a speech therapist in the Cabrini Pediatric Therapy Center. Macie's parents and therapist are optimistic that this extra support will boost Macie's chance of starting kindergarten like any other child next year!



MEET Aiden 8 YEARS OLD

When Aiden was just 7 years old, he was in a horrendous jet ski accident that resulted in the loss of his left leg. In the months that followed his amputation, Aiden received intensive physical therapy administered at the CMN funded Cabrini Pediatric Therapy Center. Not even a year later, Aiden is walking, running and jumping without a walker. "The staff at the Pediatric Therapy Center taught me everything I needed to know to support Aiden in his recovery.
